

1. General English :

Definition: General English refers to the standard register of the English language used for daily, non-specialized communication. It is the language of social interaction, casual conversations, mass media, and personal correspondence.

- **Core Purpose:** To build social connections, express personal feelings, share daily experiences, and convey everyday information quickly and efficiently.

2. Academic English:

Definition: Academic English is the specific register of the English language used in higher education, research, scholarly publications, and professional academic settings. It is the language used to teach, write, and debate discipline-specific concepts.

- **Core Purpose:** To acquire, analyze, and communicate complex knowledge, present arguments supported by evidence, and maintain a high level of precision and objectivity.
- **Key Characteristics:** Formal, structured, objective (focused on facts and data rather than the author's personal feelings), explicit, and characterized by specialized vocabulary and complex grammatical structures.

2. Academic English:
